They rediscovered quilting and the culture of their small, close knit community, and they found their passion and calling. And they found a little fame along the way.

Minnie and Tinnie have been a part of the Black Belt Treasures family since almost the beginning – and were part of the inspiration for its formation prior to opening. Today you can purchase not only one of their full sized quilts at BBTCAC, but their quilted pot holders - miniature works of art in their own right, which have been one of the top sellers each year.
